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ART HISTORY AND SPIRITUAL VALUES In Central Europe

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Course Description

This course introduces students to the most important artistic movements in history and their architectural expression. It is based on excursions to the most beautiful and valuable architectural monuments of Prague and their interpretation in the context of the cultural history of Central Europe. Shared values have always had a major influence on the forms of art and architecture. Particular attention is therefore paid to spiritual and societal values that stood behind individual artistic trends. Prague represents a unique collection in this sense. Through presentations followed by guided tours of the most representative sites, students learn not only to recognize the main artistic styles, but also to read and interpret the values they represent.

Course Objectives

The course will provide students with an overview of the most important artistic and architectural periods of Prague in the context of Central European art history. It will also enhance their competence to recognize individual artistic styles and identify their value contexts.

Course Structure and Requirements

Sessions are composed of presentations, class discussions and guided tours to relevant sites in Prague. The course is open to all students and there are no special prerequisites. Students are expected to actively participate in all class activities, including discussions and field trips, and to study the assigned study resources (available online). Other requirements include response paper and a final project.
